**Jesuit Overrun Spartans**

In conditions more befitting the Winter Olympics, the Jesuit "biathletes" overcame the cold and wet to register a stirring 26-0 win over the tough tackling Spartans of De La Salle at Concord Friday.

The Marauders produced a blistering first half display of controlled Rugby to charge to a 19-0 lead before being fully tested in a tough second half and could add only one try.

Jesuit applied the pressure early in a scrum close to the Spartan line. The ball spilled out of the back for Jesuit flanker Chris Colwell to scoop up and dive over for the try. Standoff James Poindexter converted from wide out and Jesuit led 7-0.

Jesuit was playing quality ten phase Rugby that was causing De La Salle to be under continual pressure. A pass was knocked down and Jesuit towed the ball ahead. In a dash for the ball that was over the try line center Matt Ference won the race to claim the try. Again Poindexter converted from wide out and Jesuit led 14-0.

Close to the break Jesuit added a third try when #8 Jason Fry worked the blind side from a scrum, made the initial break to send half-back Steve Esch over for the try. This time the conversion was unsuccessful but Jesuit took a 19-0 lead into the break.

It took only six minutes of the second half for Jesuit to add to its score. Its hard working pack took a scrum tight head – again Fry went the weak side and again Esch was on hand to take the final pass for the try.

Play ebbed and flowed for the balance of the half. The De La Salle defense throughout this time was uncompromising and Jesuit found itself in heavy defense on a number of occasions but it likewise held up well.

De La Salle voted Chris Fry best forward and James Poindexter best back. "Mr Versatility" Steve Esch likewise had a top game. A great deal of the credit for the game being as entertaining as it turned out to be was due to the excellent refereeing of top whistle blower Pete Smith.
