Jesuit Bedevils Davis

Jesuit continued its unbeaten run in the Sacramento Valley League with a commanding 54-10 over the Davis Devils in Davis on Friday. The win confirmed the greatly improved form of the 2004 Jesuit team.

Jesuit dominated the game throughout, ran to a 33-0 half time lead and was able to give some of its talented young players of the future a run during the second half.

This Davis side was the most inexperienced team the school has fielded but to its credit the Devils hung in during the entire game and were rewarded with the final two tries of the game.

It took Jesuit eight minutes to register first points, a try to much improved lock Craig McCoy. Jesuit launched a furious attack and won six rucks in quick succession. The Davis defense simply ran out of defenders and McCoy raced over unopposed for the try. With stand off Chris Sardon's conversion, Jesuit led 7-0.

The Three Musketeers set up Jesuit's next try. Chris Sardon made the initial break, center Eric Forner carried on the attack before winger Adam Mariani eluded his opponent to score a great try.

Full back Tyler Collins was instrumental in the next try when he made the first line break before linking with Sardon and hard working lock Eric Fry for a try that Sardon converted, giving Jesuit a 19-0 lead.

Center Eric Forner showed what great hands he has when he picked up a near-impossible pass around his boot laces, cleverly eluded the defense and raced in for the try that Sardon again converted.

Unfortunately for Davis its full back, under considerable pressure, lost the ball over his own try line and the ever present Sardon dived on the loose ball for the try. Sardon converted his own try to give Jesuit a 33-0 lead at the break.

Jesuit made a number of changes at the break to give its younger players in particular some valuable game time. The changes included the first appearance of freshman #8 Cori Nicodemus.

Forner opened the scoring in the sixth minute of the second half when he scooped up a loose ball and raced away from the defense to score. Jesuit's replacement stand off, sophomore Nate Floyd, neatly kicked the conversion for a 40-0 lead.

Eric Fry scored his second try midway through the second half and Floyd again successfully converted for a 47-0 lead. Replacement center Tyler Siegel closed out Jesuit's scoring with a powerful run of determination that took him over the Davis try line. New kicker, winger Jacob Scott converted the try for a 54-0 lead.

Davis, to its credit, took the game back to Jesuit and was rewarded when it crossed for the final two tries of what was an entertaining game, well refereed by the visiting referee from Minnesota.
