The two teams - The Magic Jerseys and the Varsity Jerseys - were made up of a mix of juniors, sophomores and freshmen while no Varsity regular players nor did any seniors (with one exception) play in the game. The two teams were coached by the Varsity XV, who was split for the occasion. The game was certainly a success.

The senior coaches were present and all except Coach Barry were somewhat taken aback by the quality of play and of players. Some players had as few as two practices under their belts before they played in this game.

Varsity opened the scoring after three minutes when Varsity bench center Tyler Siegel produced a dazzling 40-meter run through a bamboozled Magic defense to give the varsities a 5-0 lead.

The Varsity took a 12-5 lead when recent find in winger Frankie Lesui, set the crowd alight with a swerving run down the left touchline before racing around to score between the posts. The try was converted by lanky lock Ted Watje.

Almost at half time, Varsity bench half back/stand off Colin Hawley tied the score at 12-all when he touched down after a series of backline loops had worked splendidly. Hooker Kurt Frandrup amazed the large crowd when he casually converted the try from the touchline.

The half time talks by coaches were frenetic and many of the coaches were feeling the pressure as they tried to exhort their charges to better performances.

The game looked to be heading Varsity's way when Watje scored a great try after getting outside the Magic defense and outpacing the cover defense for the try. With his successful conversion the Varsity led 22-12.

"We need some Magic" became the catch-cry and Magic we did get. Just as Anthony Estrella and his band of Varsity coaching warriors were looking pleased with themselves, freshman lock Robert Wilmes scored a fine support try for the Magic and the score now stood at 22-17.

Stand out flanker, sophomore Zeke Sulzam tied the score at 22-all when he powered his way over the line after his team had pounded the Varsity try line for some period of time.

Coaches of both teams became more vocal (if that was possible) as we came to the last five minutes. Magic just kept working their magic and soon the ball was again close to the Varsity line.

As the full time hooter sounder, the goal kicking hooker (one out of three isn't bad for a hooker) Kurt Frandrup barreled his way over for the match winning try. His team had woven its magic on the game 27-22.

This past weekend Regis traveled to Chadron, NE where they pitted their speed and high altitude training against the brawn of three of the area's teams. In short order Regis shut out South Dakota State, 14-0, Wayne State (NE), 17-0, and host Chadron State, 28-7. Dan's defensive play in the first two games earned him praise from Regis coach Dan Hattrup, and to prove his versatility, Dan scored a try in the Chadron match.

College Report

Things are winding down in regular season play in the Northern California Rugby Football Union College Divisions. In Berkeley Cal again won it's own Invitational, defeating UCLA, 83-11, on Saturday and Washington, 71-5, in Sunday's championship. James Sehr and Louie Stanfill saw action in Saturday's preliminary, with James getting a try. Sunday's final saw Jesuit players Kyle Khasigian, Joe Welch and Louie Stanfill with playing time with Louie scoring once and Joe scoring four times.

In regular league games, UC Davis continued its surge with a convincing 60-5 rout of the visiting St. Mary's College Gaels. Like Cal, Nevada played twice over the weekend defeating Chico State, 46-22, in Reno on Friday night, and then traveling to Sacramento on Sunday where they defeated Sacramento State, 30-17.

League play wraps up this weekend with Sacramento traveling to St. Mary's and UC Davis going over the Sierras to take on Nevada. While the playoff teams seem set, this weekend is all about positioning and whether or not teams will travel to Washington or stay in Northern California for the Territorial playoffs the following weekend. The second and fourth place teams will travel to the Pacific Northwest where they will compete against the first and third place teams in that league, while Northern California's third and fifth place teams will remain in Northern California (or Nevada) where they will play in a tourney with the top team from Utah and the second place team from the Northwest. USARFU schedules have been changed this year so that no games will be required to be played on Sunday, thereby allowing Utah champion BYU to participate in the national championships for the first time.

Looking at the games this weekend, a UC Davis victory, tie or a loss by less than 16 points will assure the Aggies of second place and a trip to the Northwest. Reno would need to defeat the visitors by more than 16 points to finish second, otherwise they will end the league season in third. In Moraga a St. Mary's victory, a tie, or a loss by less than 16 points will send the Gaels to

the Northwest as the league's fourth place team, and keep Chico in Northern California as the fifth place team. A Sacramento State win by more than 16 will give Chico the fourth place position and put the Gaels in fifth. As the league regular season champion Cal receives a bye for the territorial playoffs. That does not mean that the Bears will be resting this weekend as they head across the border to Vancouver, B.C., where they will conclude their annual home and away with the University of British Columbia. Cal needs to defeat the Thunderbirds by more than four points to retain the "World Cup" Trophy.
