The Collegiate and Alumni Report

This past weekend teams in the Pacific Coast Rugby Football Union met in playoffs to determine the territorial representatives for the USA Rugby Football Union's Collegiate Championships. In Division I the regular season champion of the Northern California RFU, California, earned the Pacific Coast's top seed as well as a bye for the regional playoffs. The remaining two spots for the "Sweet 16" were decided on the pitch between teams from the Northern California RFU, the Pacific Northwest RFU, and the Utah RFU.

The USARFU has changed its playoff structure to avoid mandatory Sunday matches, thereby paving the way for the participation of Brigham Young University, this year's Utah RFU champion. The new policy required that the tourney to decide the territory's No. 3 spot be changed from a Saturday-Sunday format to a Friday-Saturday schedule. As the NCRFU's third place team, the University of Nevada hosted that tournament. In opening rounds Nevada defeated Oregon State, 26-15, while BYU won easily over Chico State, 48-17. On Saturday Oregon State won the consolation match over Chico, 33-21, while BYU stepped up its game, beating Nevada by a convincing 66-22 margin.

Meanwhile in Portland in Saturday's first round host Washington defeated St. Mary's for the second time on the season, this time by a 42-36 score, while UC Davis won over Washington State, 58-18. In Sunday's games, the Gaels won a close 18-16 match over Washington State while Davis ended Washington's season with a 34-14 win. The Ags move on as the territory's No. 2 seed. Cal hosted Southern California power Cal Poly, but with the playoffs looming in two weeks, the Bears used the match to test their reserves, in the end conceding the unofficial state collegiate championship to the visiting Mustangs, 58-18. Joe Welch and James Sehr were among the eleven sophomores and freshmen who started for Cal on the day.

In Division 2, where only one team from the territory advances to what is a national tourney of eight teams, Humboldt State and Santa Rosa Junior College traveled to Orem, UT, the home of Utah Valley State College. In the first round games Santa Rosa defeated the host Wolverines, 42-17, while Humboldt ran away from Western Oregon, winning 76-0. Utah Valley won the consolation game, 34-7, while in an all Northern California final Humboldt defeated Santa Rosa, 28-16 to advance to the national D-II tourney.
