The Islanders of Diablo on Monday, the Islanders of Burbank on Saturday!!! That's a big ask, but it is the ask of the 2004 Jesuit Marauder team. Two might tough games in five days.

The Marauders answered the first challenge when it scored a tough 23-17 win over a talented and willing Diablo team at Jesuit on Monday. The win takes Jesuit to the Norcal semi finals where it will meet perennial antagonist Burbank at Jesuit's Rugby Field on Saturday at 1pm.

In front of a large and excited crowd, Jesuit and Diablo turned on a game of running Rugby that very closely resembled a Jesuit v Burbank game with so much ball movement and so much counter attack.

Jesuit opened the scoring with a seventh minute penalty by Eric Forner but it was already evident that Jesuit was having problems with a team as big (if not bigger) that Burbank and certainly not any slower.

Diablo continued to pressure the Jesuit defense with quick stepping and excellent support and the team was rewarded with a fine try after 18 minutes of play. With the conversion, Diablo led 7-3 and a turn-up looked on the books.

Jesuit regained some of its composure and its quality backs continued to pressure the Diablo backs. From a Diablo turn over stand off Chris Sardon suddenly burst away, found the ever-

present wing Adam Mariani in support. Mariani drew the full back to send half back Billy Bittner over for the try.

The conversion was unsuccessful but Jesuit led 8-7 after 27 minutes of play. This lead was short lived as Diablo moved the ball quickly to the Jesuit 22. Jesuit's scrum was under pressure from the Diablo eight and from one such Jesuit scrum the ball came out poorly.

Jesuit failed to clear the ball effectively Instead a poor clearing kick was fielded by the Diablo wing. From the ensuing ruck, one of its big forwards charged over for the try and a 12-8 lead at half time.

Jesuit regrouped at the half, with very clear instructions being given by coaches about the need to rectify certain weaknesses of the first half. Jesuit responded by scoring the next 15 points to take control of the game.

In the fourth minute, Jesuit regained the lead through an Anthony Estrella bull-like charge that carried him through the Diablo defense into the try zone. Again the conversion was unsuccessful but Jesuit led 13-12.

With supporters of both teams in full voice, the battle raged on. Talented winger Adam Mariani scored a great solo try down the right wing. Again Jesuit moved the ball quickly wide to Mariani who, when confronted by his opponent, chipped neatly over his head and won the race to the ball.

His try between the uprights was converted by Chris Sardon and Jesuit had a 20-12 lead. This became 23-12 lead when Sardon added a penalty in the 23rd minute.

Not to be denied Diablo fought back tenaciously. After five penalties against Jesuit in quick succession inside their 22, a Diablo forwards finally crashed over for a much needed try and the game was alive again. Hard though they tried Diablo could not score again and Jesuit breathed a huge sigh of relief at the final whistle. The game had been won but it was a battle and a half.

Jesuit will need to look closely at its game plan for the Burbank game on Saturday as Diablo exposed a few deficiencies in the Jesuit game.

A number of Jesuit players are worthy of special mention. Hard nosed center Sean McNamara took it up to Diablo all game as did captain and flanker Steve Lewis. Flanker Zack Reed was everywhere while replacement hooker Joe Casanova wreaked havoc when let loose on the field. Lock Paul Jesseman completely dominated both the Jesuit and Diablo lineouts.

Half back Billy Bittner had a fine supporting game while center Eric Forner and full back Ryan Taylor stood rock-like in the face of continued Diablo assaults.

College Report

This past weekend the USARFU held the first and second rounds of playoffs in two divisions, and for both Men and Women. In Men's Division I games were played in four pools at three locations across the country. Close to home in Berkeley the Cal Bears again found that playing a less experienced side on the first day, while saving the more veteran team for the finals, becomes

risky as the quality of competition across the nation improves. Finding themselves down 15-13 at the half to Bowling Green, Cal sent in four All-Americans in the unfamiliar role of substitutes and took control of the second half to win 40-15. James Sehr, Joe Welch and Louie Stanfill started for the Bears and were not among those replaced when the cavalry was summoned. Though no Marauders scored, Louie received special recognition for his play, notably a long run setting up a try. On Sunday the Bears easily handled the University of North Carolina with Joe Welch and Louie Stanfill playing as Kyle Khasigian sat out with an ankle injury.

Two pools were played in Colorado Springs. In one pool defending champion Air Force defeated Tennessee 71-10 while Ohio State defeated Penn State 51-19 in opening play. In the championship game Air Force edged the Buckeyes, 16-13. In the other pool BYU and Cal Poly easily advanced to the round of eight with convincing wins over Norwich Academy and Texas A&M, respectively. In the much awaited final, Cal Poly had a surprisingly easy time of it, defeating BYU 46-29. To be fair BYU was without the services of star player and Eagle center Salesi Sika, who injured a knee ligament in the opening match. Nonetheless the result is one more indication of the steady improvement of the Mustang Rugby program.

For Marauders West Point was the place to be. Each of the four teams had a Jesuit connection as Army with Anthony Andrews played Cole Valadez' Gauchos while Navy with Damon Doykos, Chris Osegueda and Josh Rojas played UC Davis with Pat O'Sullivan, Adam Collins, and John Parshall, all under the guidance of Barry O'Connell. In separate battles of the US Department of Defense against the California Department of Education, the military won as the Ags fell to the Midshipmen, 25-16, while the Cadets defeated the Gauchos, 28-21. In the pool final Navy defeated Army for the second or third time this season while in the consolation match the Ags took it out on the Gauchos to show who was the second best UC rugby club. Out of respect for Cole's wishes the score will not be repeated here. However Pat, Adam, John and Coach Barry know what the numbers 67 and 0 mean. In other consolation matches, Purdue beat Bowling Green, Tennessee won over Penn State and Norwich Academy defeated Texas A&M. To continue the woes of the California public schools versus the Military Academies in Men's D-II, Humboldt State lost to the US Coast Guard Academy, 31-22, while the UC Davis Women were shut out by Air Force, 32-0 in Women's D-I action. It will be Chapter Two of the California public colleges against the academies in the semifinals of Men's D-I play on April 30 at Stanford as Cal Poly meets Air Force and Cal plays Navy. Winners will meet for the championship on Saturday, May 1. Should Cal advance to the final, they will play one of the last two American college teams to defeat the Bears.
