Nobody is quite sure how Jesuit won this "knock-em-down, drag-em-out" game of Rugby on Saturday but the Marauders did win and in doing so kept their quest alive for back-to-back National Championships.

Scouting reports had not indicated that Hayward would play with the non-stop intensity that they did and they may well feel they should have won the game. Jesuit was massively relieved when winger Dimitri Godamunne raced over in the fourth minutes of overtime to clinch the win.

From the word "go" it was big hit time and the Hayward aggression caught a number of the Jesuit players by surprise. It was to Hayward's credit that the Jesuit backline was virtually unable to get its running game going at any stage.

It was an unparalleled number of Jesuit errors early on that caused the momentum to swing Hayward's way. With its big pack simply pounding straight ahead down the field at every opportunity, the realization was soon there that this would not be an easy game to win.

With almost 40 penalties/free kicks and five yellow cards during the game, there was very little Rugby to report on. Jesuit managed to get the ball to its wingers in a backline move twice in the game, a feat bettered by Hayward, who managed it three times.

Jesuit scored first after 20 minutes when tyro #8 Eric "Bundy" Fry crashed over after Jesuit elected to take a quick tap. Hayward evened the score after 23 minutes of the second half when, after frequent assaults on the Jesuit line, its talented center outflanked the Jesuit defense to tie the score.

With the score tied 5-all at the end of the regulation time, it was sudden death overtime. Jesuit forced Hayward deep into its 22 and after a series of attacks on the Hayward line, flying winger Dimitri Godamunne outran his opponent for the winning try.

Jesuit can thank hard working captain Eric Fry for doing the work of half the pack in a superb effort while the defensive lineout jumping of Alex Murchison was top class. Hayward found it exceedingly difficult to win a lineout on its own throw.

Hayward nominated Eric Fry as the best forward and Colin Hawley as the best back.

For whatever reason, Rio Americano was allowed to play its Varsity A team in the Varsity B Sac Valley Tournament. That makes the narrow victory by the Marauders all the more satisfying. This was a high quality, flowing and skillful game extremely well refereed by top whistleblower, Matt Eason.

It was certainly a game of two halves. Jesuit came out guns blazing and raced to a 24-5 half time lead. Rio totally dominated the second half, outscoring Jesuit 20 points to three. The last ten minutes of the game brought continual excitement as Rio fought desperately to make up the leeway.

Amazingly it took Jesuit 25 seconds to score the first try. Rio fumbled the kick-off, the talented sophomore Ian Forner grabbed the ball, bamboozled the Rio defense before sending sophomore winger Will Wegner racing over in the corner. Forner missed the conversion from the touch line.

After 10 minutes, hard working flanker John Lucas capped some enterprising lead up work by slicing through the surprised Rio defense close in for a neat individual try. This time Forner converted from wide out and Jesuit led 12-0.

Rio's backline included at least three class players and one of their centers opened the scoring for Rio with a great individual try in which he broke at least five poor Jesuit attempts at tackling.

Jesuit was not to be denied and with half back Pierce Cooley feeding good ball to stand-off Ian Forner, Jesuit launched a number of backline raids. Sophomore lock Cori Nicodemus and elusive hooker Kurt Frandrup added first half tries as Jesuit raced to the 24-5 half time lead.

Rio came out for the second half breathing fire and quickly opened the scoring with a neat field goal followed by two excellent tries, one a 70 meter try after a quick tap was taken just outside the Rio 20 meter line.

With the score 24-20 and all the momentum with Rio, Jesuit had to resort to shots at penalty goal. Forner kicked one of two late in the game to extend the lead to 27-20 but Rio was not to be denied and scored on the stroke of full time. The conversion unfortunately was wide and Jesuit had weathered the storm to qualify for the final against Rio Linda.
