

From the Director

Welcome to the Black Box!

Two things from an expert:

"Any movement toward wholeness begins with the acknowledgment of our own suffering, and of the suffering in the world. This doesn't mean getting caught in a never-ending vortex of pain, melancholy, and, especially, victimhood. True healing simply means opening ourselves to the truth of our lives, past and present, as plainly and objectively as we can.
