The Basics: XL and Honors

- XL/Honors courses are high school level courses that provide a more rigorous presentation of material normally covered in a standard high school course.
- Typically, XL courses are offered for freshmen and sophomores only.
- Honors level courses try to bridge the gap between accelerated and Advanced Placement courses (in Math and World Language, for example).

Jesuit High School's XL/Honors Courses

- English: English 1XL; English 2H
- World Languages: French 3H; Latin 3H; Spanish 1XL/Spanish 2XL/Spanish 3H
- Mathematics: Geometry XL; Algebra 2H; Pre-Calculus H (redesignated for 24-25)
- Sciences: Biology XL
- Visual & Performing Arts: Honors Art Studio, Symphonic Band Honors,
 Orchestra Honors, Chamber Choir Honors*, Jazz Band Honors*
- * Class takes place outside the standard 7-period school day.

All XL/Honors/AP courses earn honors GPA points for a student's Jesuit GPA. All Honors and AP designated classes except Algebra 2H and the VPA Honors courses are eligible for UC Honors points when students apply to the UC, up to a maximum of 8 semesters.

The Basics: AP®

- AP[®] courses are college-level courses offered in high school that reflect what is taught in most introductory college courses.
- Students take AP Exams and/or submit projects to the AP Digital Portfolio at the end of the course, demonstrating their mastery of college-level work.
- Depending on a student's college of attendance, a score of 3 or higher on an AP exam can typically earn students college credit and/or placement into advanced courses in college.


Jesuit High School's AP® Courses

- English: English Language, English Literature
- Social Sciences: Human Geography, U.S. History, Macroeconomics,
 Microeconomics, U.S. Government & Politics, Psychology
- Mathematics: Calculus AB, Calculus BC, Statistics (new 22-23)
- **Sciences:** Biology, Chemistry, Physics 1, Physics 2, Environmental Science (new 23-24)
- Visual & Performing Arts: Music Theory, Drawing (new 22-23), 2D Art and Design (new 23-24)
- World Languages: Spanish Language, French Language
- Computer Science: Computer Science Principles, Computer Science A
- Capstone: Seminar, Research

Elective AP courses: AP Seminar (10th or 11th grade)
AP Research (11th or 12th grade)

Interdisciplinary, inquiry-based



2023 AP Performance at a Glance

- 359 Jesuit students took 867 AP Exams
- 63 students recognized as AP Scholars (score of 3 or higher on 3 AP exams)
- 20 students recognized as AP Scholars with Honors (avg. score of at least 3.25 on 4 exams)
- 60 students recognized as AP Scholars with Distinction (avg. score of a least 3.5 on 5 exams)
- 9 students earned an AP Capstone Diploma, and 2 earned the AP Seminar and AP Research Certificate

AP School Honor Roll and AP Access Award

New College Board distinctions celebrating student access to and success in AP course, like being on the *Gold Honor Roll*:

70% of seniors have taken an AP course at Jesuit.

54% of seniors have earned an AP exam score of 3 or better on at least one exam.

31% of seniors have taken at least 5 AP courses during their time at Jesuit.



Additionally, we have been recognized with the *AP Access Award* which recognizes that students from underrepresented populations have proportional or better enrollment in AP courses.

AP[®] Exams

AP Exams are administered at Jesuit on set dates in May each year.

- AP classes at Jesuit require that students take the corresponding AP Exam at the end of the school year.
- Students are not required to attend classes on days they are taking AP Exams.
- Exams are typically 2.5–3.5 hours and include multiple choice and free response components.

Jesuit High School AP® Exam Fees

- The exam fee for the 2023-2024 school year is \$98 per exam for all traditional courses; AP Capstone fees are \$146 per exam.
- Exam registration and payment all takes place in the fall (September-November).
- There is a \$40 per exam cancellation fee if a student cancels an AP Exam after having signed up to take the exam. This fee is imposed by College Board. The same fee applies for late exam orders.
- Assistance is available for eligible students with financial need.

College Credit and Placement Opportunities

Each college and university has its own policies regarding AP[®] credit and placement. The College Board offers information about AP credit at thousands of college and universities at

XL/Honors/AP[®]: The Benefits

- Students learn rigorous college-level content and skills
- Taking these courses is valued in the college admission process
- These courses provide a challenging and rewarding academic experience for high performing students
- AP courses provided an opportunity to earn valuable credit and advanced placement in college
- All XL / Honors / AP courses receive a 1 point grade point bump (e.g. a B earns 4 grade points rather than 3)

XL/Honors /AP®: A More Engaging Learning Experience

These courses challenge students to work and participate at a college level:

- Opportunities to explore topics in depth
- More time in and out of the classroom required to complete assignments and projects
- High expectations for critical thinking, analysis, synthesis, use of evidence, balancing multiple perspectives, and clear written and verbal communications

Time Management – A day in the life

A "typical day" for a student taking 3 or more AP courses and a major co-curricular activity/sport

- 8:00 a.m. 3:00 p.m. School. Lunchtime/Community Period spent tutoring, etc.
- 3:15 p.m. 6:00 p.m. Practice (extra time on game/meet days)
- 6:00 p.m. 7:00 p.m. Home and dinner
- 7:00 p.m. 10:00 p.m. Homework
- 10:00 p.m. 7:00 a.m. Sleep

Also add in 8 hours of sleep!

Note: Weekends may also be taken up with travel to required events/games/performances related to these activities
